

All are welcome at St. Andrew's Episcopal Cathedral. While this is absolutely true, some days this statement is harder to live into than others. The stress of COVID 19 combined with the death of George Floyd has left us all unnerved, exhausted and emotional. Which is why it is so important for us to once again claim our baptismal covenant language as the Book of Common Prayer so beautifully provides. We joined together last Sunday for the Feast of Pentecost to reaffirm our baptismal language. We promised, with God's help to:

Continue in the apostle's teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of the bread, and in the prayers. Continue every day - every time we gather in prayer for one another, for our city and leaders, for those who are sick and those who have died. A daily practice of prayer keeps us connected with one another and with God. Despite our social distance, we continue to learn, to pray, to connect.

Persevere in resisting evil, and whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord. This is especially heavy on our hearts today as we must face the sin we all carry for the continued oppression of racism. It is not enough to blame another for "worse sins" and feel absolved. We of white privilege must own our compliance in a system that continues to favor us even in the face of a pandemic that is taking the lives of our black and brown brothers and sisters at far greater numbers than our white brothers and sisters. It is not enough to post outrage or join a march against police violence without also considering continuing issues of food deserts, mass incarceration, poverty, unequal educational opportunities, and the like. Now more than ever we need to join in the work we began in Jackson with our Community Partners (see below), to build on the relationships that we have in our community to help oppressed minorities long after the marches end and the news coverage is over.

Proclaim by word and example the Good News of Christ. In a world of chaos and strife, it is not enough to just say or even to do but we are called to be an example of God's good news. God is faithful yesterday, today, and tomorrow. We have hope in the Risen Christ that reminds us that the violent retribution and dark groaning of Good Friday was not the end. A glorious Resurrection followed, and even that is not the end as Jesus calls us to witness, to see our connection to God, as Christ is lifted up to rejoin the Trinity. Then on Pentecost the great Advocate, the Holy Spirit, blew in with such force that people felt the refreshing gust of wind, the burning refining fire, the peace and understanding now felt deep in our souls. We are given that power and glory to profess by word and example in this city.

Seek and serve Christ in all persons loving your neighbor as yourself. This pandemic has not always brought out the best in us as the stress mounts and we bounce from one outrage to another and yet we are still called to love - above all else to love. We must break this culture of contempt that has gripped our nation. Love self; love other; love God. See our community partners below and find your place to share God's love!

Strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being. Justice and peace - these are not two poles or opposing ideals but a united vision for us to claim as the kingdom of God. We don't get to choose between hard options: police and protester, black and white, red and blue, Christian and non-Christian, me and you. Together we give of our time and money and heart to bring all God's children to a place of justice and peace. Together with our community partners we claim our place in Jackson Mississippi at this time to welcome all and give them a spirit to know and to love God and the gift of joy and wonder in all God's works.
