Who is wise and understanding among you? Show by your good life that your works are done with gentleness born of wisdom. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Holy and gracious God: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Creator of all. Called to Serve on the Vestry? The Vestry has appointed the Nominating Committee for the 2019 Vestry election: Jack Allin, Wes Davis, Garland Lyell, V.V. Selman, and Libba Wilkes. In accordance with Canon 23 of the Diocesan Canons, any confirmed Communicant, being canonically resident and actually residing in the Parish and not less than twenty-one years of age before the election takes place, is eligible for election as a Vestry Member. In addition, a candidate must have been certified by the Treasurer to have made a financial commitment to the Parish and known to be regular in attendance. The spouse, parent, grandparent, domestic partner, sibling, or child of a Warden or Vestry member, or of a member of the staff (including clergy on staff), is ineligible for nomination and election to the Vestry or as a Warden during the Vestry member's or Warden's term of service. If you or someone you know may be called to serve for a three-year term (January 2019 – January 2022) on the Vestry, please contact the committee using the email address nominate@standrews.ms by September 30.
