A READING FROM JAMES

JAMES 3:1-12

Not many of you should become teachers, my brothers and sisters, for you know that we who teach will be judged with greater strictness. For all of us make many mistakes. Anyone who makes no mistakes in speaking is perfect, able to keep the whole body in check with a bridle. If we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we guide their whole bodies. Or look at ships: though they are so large that it takes strong winds to drive them, yet they are guided by a very small rudder wherever the will of the pilot directs. So also the tongue is a small member, yet it boasts of great exploits. How great a forest is set ablaze by a small fire!

And the tongue is a fire. The tongue is placed among our members as a world of iniquity; it stains the whole body, sets on fire the cycle of nature, and is itself set on fire by hell. For every species of beast and bird, of reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by the human species, but no one can tame the tongue~ a restless evil, full of deadly poison. With it we bless the Lord and Father, and with it we curse those who are made in the likeness of God. From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. My brothers and sisters, this ought not to be so. Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and brackish water? Can a fig tree, my brothers and sisters, yield olives, or a grapevine figs? No more can salt water yield fresh.

MARK 8:27-38

People Glory to you, O Christ.

Jesus went on with his disciples to the villages of Caesarea Philippi; and on the way he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that I am?" And they answered him, "John the Baptist; and others, Elijah; and still others, one of the prophets." He asked them, "But who do you say that I am?" Peter answered him, "You are the Messiah." And he sternly ordered them not to tell anyone about him. Then he began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things." He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."

LORD, HAVE MERCY: THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

The Prayers of the People are at the heart of nearly every liturgy in our beloved Book of Common Prayer. Whether or not a service includes Eucharist, or a sermon, or music, some form of intercessory prayer is included, even in such simple rubrics as "Prayers may be offered for ourselves and others." On Sunday mornings, the Prayers of the People, as directed on page 383 in the prayerbook, are to include intercessions for: the Church, its members, and its mission; the Nation and all in authority; the welfare of the world; the concerns of the local community; prayers for those who suffer; and prayers for the departed.

Most congregations use a combination of the intercessory forms provided in the prayerbook and prayers written locally to reflect particular needs or occasions. Prayer cycles are shared worldwide for parishes, dioceses, and other ministries in the Episcopal Church - in fact, on one Sunday every year, every Episcopal congregation in the world prays for the Diocese of Mississippi! Our parish prayer lists are filled with the names of parishioners and our friends and family members who are in need, or who are celebrating a birthday.

This fall, we will shift the way in which we use our parish prayer list for those in need. At the 7:30 am and 11:00 am services, the entire prayer list will be read, as has always been done. At 8:40 am, only those names added to the prayer list in the last week will be read. The entire prayer list will continue to be printed in the bulletin, so that those who wish to take it home and pray with it throughout the week can do so.

Please do note, if you have submitted a name for our Sunday prayer list, that we do try to be good stewards of that list, removing names when a crisis has passed, or moving names to our longer term prayer list, prayed on weekdays at noon, when needs are more chronic than urgent.
